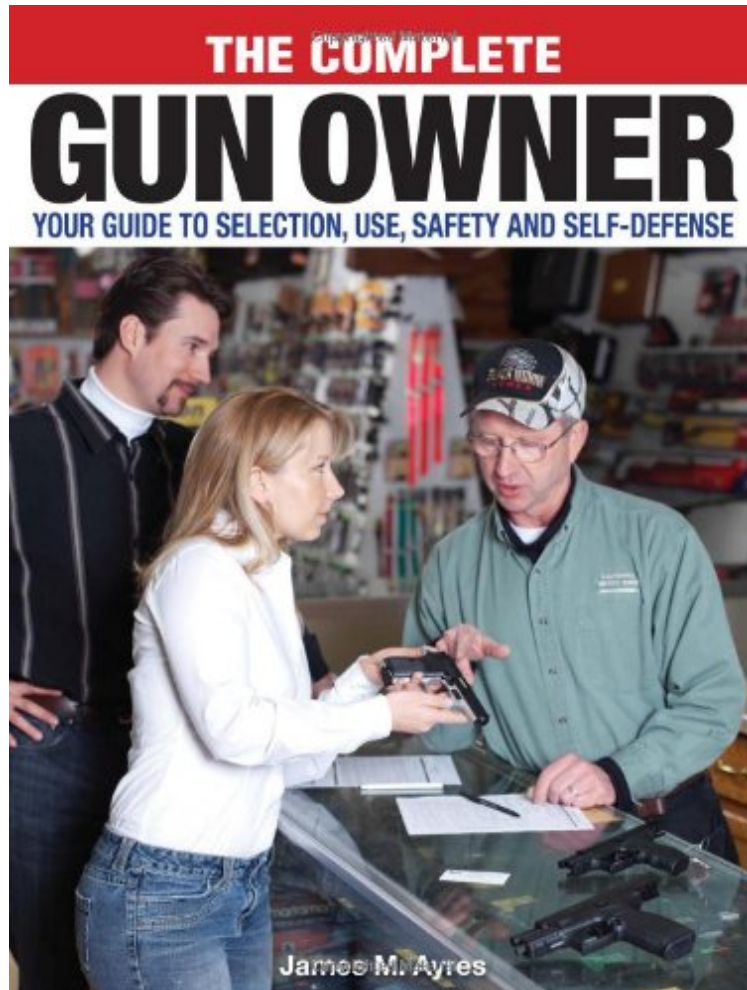

It claims to cover a great deal of territory in introducing firearms; it succeeds. The author does this via two themes or principles, presented, illustrated, and expanded via an internally consistent blending of narrative, experiences, and judgment.The two themes could be seen as: (1) do not be blinded by a quest for more

power than one can control, and (2) “work” is not a four-letter word. For those who believe that they must have a magnum capable of stopping a tank and are not willing to explore alternatives, do not buy the book. But if one is willing to explore alternatives even if they believe they magnums are necessary, buy the book and read it. See the narrative of a hunt where “Dexter” with his .300 Win. Mag. could not control it and came home empty-handed. (pp: 60-62) For evidence beyond narrative, see the reporting of W. D. M. “Karamojo” who used a 6.5x54mm rifle, roughly akin to a 30-30 but with appropriate bullets, to take African elephants and Cape buffalo. (p. 66) Ayres’ theme is captured by the notion that bullet placement is critical and too much power can interfere with placement. Regardless of where one stands on the first theme, Ayres is consistent, persistent, in arguing that work with a firearm is absolutely necessary for “use, safety, and self-defense.” In defusing the cultural notion that magical results can occur if we just buy the right thing, the text provides a very valuable alternative—work hard and smart in whatever one attempts. Value received will far transcend the cost of the book. I highly recommend the book and suggest multiple passes through it. In other words, work at it to obtain value, not just for firearms, but for living life.
